

## **Electric Delivery Charge and Supply Costs**

If your electric bill was \$150, the breakdown would look like this:



Dollar amounts are approximate and based on rates as of July 1, 2022. Your bill may differ based on your current rate and energy use.

Energy bills can be confusing. Several line items make up your bill, but they really fall into four categories:1) supply; 2) transmission; 3) distribution, operations and service; and 4) public policy. All the categories, except for supply, combine to form the delivery charge on your bill.

The components of the delivery charge fund operating, maintaining and upgrading the electric grid, critical customer services, and state and federally mandated charges that fund financial assistance, energy efficiency and renewable energy programs.

The supply charge is the cost of energy you use. We purchase energy from suppliers on your behalf and pass the cost directly to you, no profit added.

The amount of electricity you use each month impacts both supply and delivery charges. Using less energy can help lower your overall bill.

- Will my supply rate change over time, or stay the same?
- Are there early termination fees to change to a different supplier?

Natural gas is a safe and reliable fuel when used properly. It is colorless and odorless. As a safety precaution, we add a distinctive rotten-egg odor to natural gas so you can smell a gas leak quickly.

How to recognize a gas leak:

- Smell it. You will smell a distinctive, pungent odor, similar to rotten eggs.
- See it. You may see a white cloud, mist, fog, bubbles in standing water or blowing dust. You may also see vegetation that appears to be dead or dying for no apparent reason.
- Hear it. You may hear unusual noises like roaring, hissing or whistling.

If you detect a gas leak:

- Leave the area immediately and move to a safe environment.
- Call 911 immediately and then call Eversource at 800-592-2000.
- Do not smoke or operate electrical switches, appliances, cell phones and land lines. These items may produce a spark that can ignite the gas and cause an explosion.
- Do not assume someone else will report the condition.
- Provide the exact location, including cross streets.
- Let us know if digging activities are going on in the area.
