

Can I Shop for an Energy Supplier?

Did you know that you are able to compare rates from other suppliers for the energy supply portion of your bill? The New Hampshire Public Utilities Commission licenses competitive suppliers within the state and maintains a list of registered energy suppliers on its website, puc.nh.gov. You can also visit Eversource.com for more information.

Here are some important questions you should ask when considering a supplier:

1. What is the length of the contract?
2. Is this a fixed or variable rate?
3. Do early termination fees apply?
4. Can I switch to another supplier?
5. Who do I contact if I have questions?
6. Are you licensed in the state, and what if you discontinue service in the region?



Important Information on the Renewable Portfolio Standard

This bill contains information regarding the statewide average cost of compliance with New Hampshire's Renewable Portfolio Standard, or RPS, for 2019. The RPS statute, RSA 362-F, requires each electricity provider (including Eversource) to meet customer load by purchasing or acquiring certificates representing generation from renewable energy sources based on total megawatt-hours supplied. Under the RPS statute, electricity providers are required to generate or purchase renewable energy certificates from suppliers through the New England Power Pool Generation Information System. A renewable energy certificate represents 1 megawatt-hour of electricity produced from eligible renewable energy sources and may be sold separately from the associated electricity. If an electricity provider is not able to meet the RPS requirements by purchasing or acquiring renewable energy certificates, it must pay alternative compliance payments (ACPs), and the proceeds from the ACPs are then used to fund qualified renewable energy initiatives and projects. The 2019 statewide average cost of RPS compliance, as calculated by the New Hampshire Public Utilities Commission, is \$0.0061 per kilowatt-hour (kWh).
